FGCs embody a strong set of values about people. At the heart of FGC philosophy are political and social principles of respect for citizens, self-determination, democracy, collective responsibility and the importance of family relationships, culture and identity to children's lives. The FGC model seeks to transform relationships between the State and families on matters concerning the care and well-being of children. FGCs originated in New Zealand with Maori groups inspiring and leading change as a response to oppressive practice and institutional racism from state agencies who sought to impose 'solutions' on families, and in doing so separated many children from their communities."
